Another worthy charity, the GCFP has a mission of addressing food insecurity issues among the residents of their community. If you were with us last year, you will no doubt remember the impact when Katie Dix, President of GCFP handed out apples to all the tables. Problem was, there were not enough apples for every person sitting at that table. With one simple question, "How does it feel to not have enough or have what others have?" she made us realize how people feel when it comes to getting enough food for themselves and more importantly, their families. This was our second time supporting GCFP. Although we have given to them in the past, Katie was not around at that time. Hoping for \$500, she was floored when we presented her the checks totally \$20,000. In fact, she wrote in her thank-you letter "The first thing your donations did was to create excitement for our mission in a way a ton of day-old bread will never do."

Additionally, we donated money to The Arvada Food Bank and La Puente Home in Alamosa, CO for a 2016 total of \$47,500. That brings our lifetime total to almost \$400,000 in donations over the past 12 Rallyes.



RULES AND SURVIVAL TIPS

The Peak to Peak is not a high speed rallye. Please observe all speed limits and road signs. Especially in built up areas and small towns. There is no police escort for protection against the "County Mounties". Please be courteous to local drivers, we don't want to wear out our welcome. These days most drivers carry cell phones and they won't hesitate to use them to call the cops.

Use your best judgement and caution on the mountain passes and roads. Conditions can change around the next curve. Either wet roads or wildlife crossing the road or another hairpin curve. There are many decreasing radius turns on the passes, sometimes one after the other. Expect the unexpected.

Colorado wildlife is more than celebrity parties in Aspen. Watch out for deer and large elk crossing the road. Also, sheep, goats, antelope and other four-legged things. These animals seem to be incapable of properly judging "closing speeds". Give them plenty of room. The sign "Open Range" beside the road means that cattle are free to wander wherever they feel like. Which usually means the middle of the highway. The rallye coincides with hunting season, so beware of two-legged animals in orange vests, drinking beer and carrying a rifle. You don't want to anger this species. All cars must be road legal and drivers must carry basic liability insurance as required in Colorado.

SURVIVAL AT ALTITUDE

If you are not used to high altitude it's a good idea to take it easy the first couple days and drink plenty of water. You can quickly become dehydrated in the dry air of the mountains. Carry bottled water in your car. Eight glasses a day sounds like a lot, but you need it. Don't forget sunglasses, a hat and your sunscreen. The sun can be very intense at altitude. That is if it doesn't snow...So, bring warm clothes and driving gloves. You just might need them as well.

INTRODUCING YOUR DEAK TO DEAK SAFETY LIAISON



Beginning in 2017, we have made the decision to address driver's safety at a level even greater than previously. Due to some questionable driving practices in the past, which have in some cases garnered the attention of government employed authorities that drive cars with flashing lights, and that we wish to avoid from this point on, we have enlisted the expertise of one of our long time Peak to Peak participants, Fred Veitch. Fred has been active with sports cars since the mid-seventies. He's raced SCCA, POC, PCA and NASA events in a variety of

cars, and won the Pikes Peak Hill Climb (Time Attack 2 Class) in 2014 with a class record. Harry and Greg Mathews credit Fred as having been their first track instructor at the Woody Creek road course in Aspen... although Fred denies this occurrence and claims to have alternative facts to support his position. Fred's job during the tour is to promote safe driving skills. We are happy to have him on board!

LUGGAGE AND MECHANICAL BREAKDOWN

A transporter will be available with some tools and equipment to deal with mechanical problems or to haul a car to the next hotel at the end of the day's driving or to the nearest repair shop. Although, there will be certain portions of the route that the transporter will not be able to follow due to vehicle length restrictions.

We will also have a second support vehicle available that will be used to carry any luggage you aren't able to carry in your sports car.



RALLYE NOTES

Day 2 - Monday, September 18

First Day of Driving Golden to Estes Park

With the opening festivities behind us, it is now the time where rubber meets the road. Upon leaving our home base in Golden, we waste no time hitting some classic Colorado terrain. A jaunt through Clear Creek Canyon leads us to a brief encounter with Interstate 70, and then on to US-40 where we make the climb up and over Berthoud Pass. This provides us with the first ascent over 10,000' and the Continental Divide. The ski area/town of Winter Park, popular year around, makes a nice spot for a quick coffee break. A spell down the road we reach the town of Granby. It is here that we make the turn

on to US-34 where we will encounter the most spectacular scenery of the day.

Passing alongside Granby and Shadow Mountain reservoirs, we soon reach the Village of Grand Lake, home to Colorado's largest natural lake. This is also where we make our entrance to Rocky Mountain National Park (RMNP), one of the United States most popular. Trail Ridge Road is the stretch of US-34 that leads us through RMNP. Modest speed limits through the park should be closely adhered to as they are set to help protect the vast number of wildlife that reside here. Don't be surprised

to see deer, elk, moose, and possibly even bear just going about their business in lush meadows throughout the park. Often times they will be seen crossing the roadway. A stop at the Alpine Visitor Center is a must for some excellent sight seeing before making the descent towards our lunch stop in Estes Park. With a maximum elevation of 12,183', our surroundings offer up the highest point we will pass through this week. Lunch today will be served up at The Other Side restaurant in Estes Park.

Our afternoon drive will be a short one, to say the least. Estes Park will also serve as our destination for the night. The historic Stanley Hotel will

accommodate our dining and sleeping needs. But before heading directly to the Stanley you will want to take some time investigating downtown Estes Park with its quaint shops. If salt water taffy is your thing then you are in the right place. Check-in at the hotel isn't until 3:00 so you will have time to look around. One thing to be aware of is that we will be staying in the newly constructed Aspire building, not the original Stanley Hotel. Aspire has all the latest technology and comforts of today, but still holds plenty of the charm that the original has. We will also have opportunities to enjoy the original hotel as arrangements have been made to hold tonight's dinner and tomorrow's breakfast there.



The Stanley Hotel is commonly known for serving as horror novelist Stephen King's inspiration for his 1977 best-selling novel, The Shining. "Heere's Johnny"! Is the historic Stanley truly haunted? We won't have to discover this for ourselves since we will be resting comfortably in our rooms at the Aspire. The Stanley was also prominently featured in the 1994 film, Dumb and Dumber. There it was known as the fictional "Hotel Danbury" of Aspen. "A place where the beer flows like wine & beautiful women instinctively flock like the salmon of Capistrano".



RALLYE NOTES

Day 3 - Tuesday, September 19

Second Day of Driving *Estes Park to Steamboat*

Today we begin our journey by heading east on US-34 and into the Big Thompson Canyon. The Big Thompson River has been the site of some historic and devastating flooding, most notably in 1976 and again in 2013. Caution should be observed while passing through this area as we may encounter traffic delays due to a reconstruction project created by the most recent flooding event. This route is also quite popular with bicyclists, whom may appear suddenly around any of the many twists and turns this road consists of. It will be roughly 22.8 miles before we turn left off of US-34 and on to N County Rd 27. The turn can be easily missed so look for the sign that points to Masonville.

N County Rd 27 will lead you to CO-14 and the Cache la Poudre River Canyon. A favorite destination for trout anglers, the "Poudre River" was named for its rough translation of "cache of powder". It refers to an incident in the 1820's when French trappers, caught by a snowstorm,

were forced to bury part of their gunpowder along the banks of the river. CO-14 is a scenic byway which gradually ushers us to the 10,276' summit of Cameron Pass. The pass was named for Robert Cameron, the founder of the Fort Collins Agricultural Colony in the 1870's. The descent from Cameron Pass places us in the area known as North Park, and the town of Walden, where we will be welcomed by the River Rock Café. You'll want to hit the gas station in Walden as it will be a while before you see the next one.

Some wide-open spaces then connect us from Walden to US-40 and then the turn on to CO-134, where we will encounter Gore Pass. This is where we will find one of the most enjoyable driving roads we'll have the pleasure of travelling this week. I trust you will agree! A "tempting" drive along this treasure connects us with CO-131 in the town(?) of Toponas. The actual designation for Toponas is "rural village". With a population of 26 you may miss it if you blink. The community took its name from nearby Toponas Rock, which was taken from the Indian word meaning Sleeping Lion. This is in no way related to the belief of one of our long-time Peak to Peakers (I'm looking at you, Fred) that the Indian word for Slow Buffalo is Corvette.

From Toponas, we pass through Yampa, Phippsburg and Oak Creek before reaching today's destination of Steamboat Springs. We will be staying at the highly acclaimed Steamboat Grand Hotel. The Grand will actually be our home for the next two nights.





RALLYE NOTES

Day 4 - Wednesday, September 20

Third Day of Driving

The Steamboat Loop (or a "chill" day in Steamboat)

Because we are staying in Steamboat for two consecutive nights, today offers you the opportunity to either remain in Steamboat to experience all the area has to offer, or take the specially designed driving loop that will take us into some phenomenal parts of southern Wyoming. It's a long day but absolutely worth it. From start to finish, today delivers the most enjoyable driving experience of the week.

The drive begins with us heading east on US-40 up and over Rabbit Ears Pass. To the east you will be able to see the rock formation that gave the pass its name. The formation is crumbling but you'll still have an idea where the name came from. The descent from Rabbit Ears leads us on to CO-14 where we'll back track a section of road we travelled yesterday. As with any roadway, when travelled in the opposite direction it creates an entirely different effect. Either way, in the case of CO-14, the meaning equals FUN. The dictionary actually defines it as such (at least it should). We pass through Walden, where we stopped for lunch yesterday, but now we continue north into Wyoming where the driving enjoyment continues to elevate. WY-230 takes us to Laramie, where there is a prime opportunity to stretch the legs and re-fuel at the Shell station where WY-230 & WY-130 intersect. A 30 mile, wide-open stretch of WY-130 takes us to the base of the Snowy Range. And as if we weren't already having a grand ol' time, this is what we are here for.

The Snowy Range is located within the Medicine Bow National Forest (MBNF). Today, we will be covering a significant stretch of MBNF. WY-130 is marked as a Wyoming Scenic Byway. You will certainly see why. As we reach the highest points of WY-130 we'll encounter Snowy Range Pass (10,847') and Medicine Bow Peak (12,013'). It is here that in 1955, United Airlines Flight 409 crashed into the side of the mountain; there were no survivors. A memorial stone and plaque were placed at an overlook viewing site located on the left side of the Hwy. A

stop here is highly recommended for a great photo op. Lake Marie only enhances the spectacular view. Now it's on to our lunch appointment at Bella's Bistro in Saratoga. It's definitely a hidden gem.

The MBNF covers 1,096,891 acres of southeastern Wyoming. We will have the pleasure of travelling over a great number of them compliments of WY-70. There are a number of pull-over's for photo and viewing ops along the way so no matter how truly enjoyable the drive is, try and force yourself to stop and smell the roses at least once.

Entering the town of Baggs, you'll want to make sure all traffic laws are adhered to, not that you haven't been doing so already, right? From here on back to Steamboat, the roadways are more heavily travelled than what we have encountered today thus far. The section of US-40 from Craig to Steamboat is a favorite monitoring section for authority figures with the ability (and desire) to make our day memorable in a way we'd rather it wasn't.

After today's lengthy outing we will be dining on-site at the Grand, in grand-style to be sure. Take a deep breath, exhale, and enjoy.

- → (.3 m) Right onto Walton Creek Rd
- → (.5 m) Left onto US-40 E / Lincoln Ave
- → (22 m) Left onto CO-14 E
- → (32.8 m) Left onto CO-125 N / CO-14 E through Walden
- → (14.6 m) Continue straight onto CO-127 N
- → (9.1 m) CO-127 N becomes WY 230 E
- → (239.9 m) Left onto WY-130 W / Snowy Range
- → Recommended fuel stop in Laramie, WY or Saratoga, WY
- → (68 m) Right to stay on WY-130 W
- → (7.9 m) Lunch at Bella's Bistro, 218 N 1st St, Saratoga, WY (Green building on left)
- → After lunch head south on WY-130 E / W Main St
- → (7.9 m) Continue straight onto WY-230 E
- → (10.1 m) Continue straight onto WY-70 W
- → (.9 m) Right onto 6th St
- → (.3 m) Left onto WY-70 W /Mac Farlane Ave
- → (56.2 m) Left onto WY-789 S / Penland St, in Baggs
- → (2.6 m) Continue onto CO-13 S
- → (38.3 m) Left onto E 4th St, in Craig





RALLYE NOTES

Day 5 - Thursday, September 21

Fourth Day of Driving Steamboat Springs to Golden

Our final day on the road is always designed to be a bit shorter. This allows us a chance to rest up a bit and get gussied-up (to whatever extent you so desire) before our final gathering at this evenings Closing Banquet. However taking short cuts is not the Peak to Peak way. Instead of a more direct route to our lunch stop in Dillon, we'll be backtracking westerly via US-40 for about 28 miles in order to include a trek over one of the coolest sections of road we will indulge in this week. County Rd 27, also known as 22 Mile Rd, just simply had to be included in this year's route. As has been said in the past, you can thank us later.

22 Mile Rd connects us with CO-131 just north of Oak Creek where we journey south to Toponas. You remember Toponas, don't you? Or did you blink the first time? Don't say you weren't warned. From here we once again are able to run a reverse route over a short section of road we hit previously. This time it's Gore Pass. And once again, driving it the other way makes for an entirely different experience, but no less enjoyable. As we say in Peak to Peak speak, "WAHOO"! A short stint on US-40 brings us to CO-9 in Kremmling where we make our way south to Silverthorne and Dillon. On the way there we skirt Green Mountain Reservoir. created by President Roosevelt as part of the Colorado-Big Thompson Project in 1937. Today, it is a popular spot for anglers of all types of trout and Kokanee to congregate. Dillon sits down the road a bit where we'll visit the Dam Brewery for lunch. Dillon Reservoir lies just beyond Dillon Dam (the actual dam, not the Dam Brewery). The reservoir is the largest water storage facility owned and operated by Denver Water and is also wildly popular with water sportsmen of all types.

Leaving Dillon we get one more opportunity for altitude sickness as we head towards Loveland Pass. We pass by the Keystone and Arapahoe Basin ski areas along the way. Loveland Pass, reaching 11,990', was the main thoroughfare between Denver and Vail before the Eisenhower/Johnson tunnel projects were completed in the 1970's. Just before we reconnect with Interstate 70, we pass one last ski area, Loveland Basin. From here it's a leisurely cruise down I-70 and back to reality. We're back to the big city with plenty of time to catch our breath and reload. Take advantage of the opportunity as you may well need the ammunition. The Closing Banquet (a.k.a. Roast) is yet to come and you never know who's on the "hit list".

It was an honor having you with us this week. We hope you enjoyed yourselves as much as we intended!

- → (23.2 m) Right onto CO-131 S
- → (19 m) Veer left onto CO-134 E
- → (26.8 m) Right onto US-40 E
- → (6.3 m) Right onto CO-9 S / 6th St

- → (20.4 m) Take the ramp onto I-70 E
- → (.3 m) Merge onto I-70 E
- → (42.3 m) Take exit 260 toward US-6 W / 6th Ave
- → (1 m) Keep left at fork, follow signs for 6th Ave / US-6 and Merge onto CO-470 W
